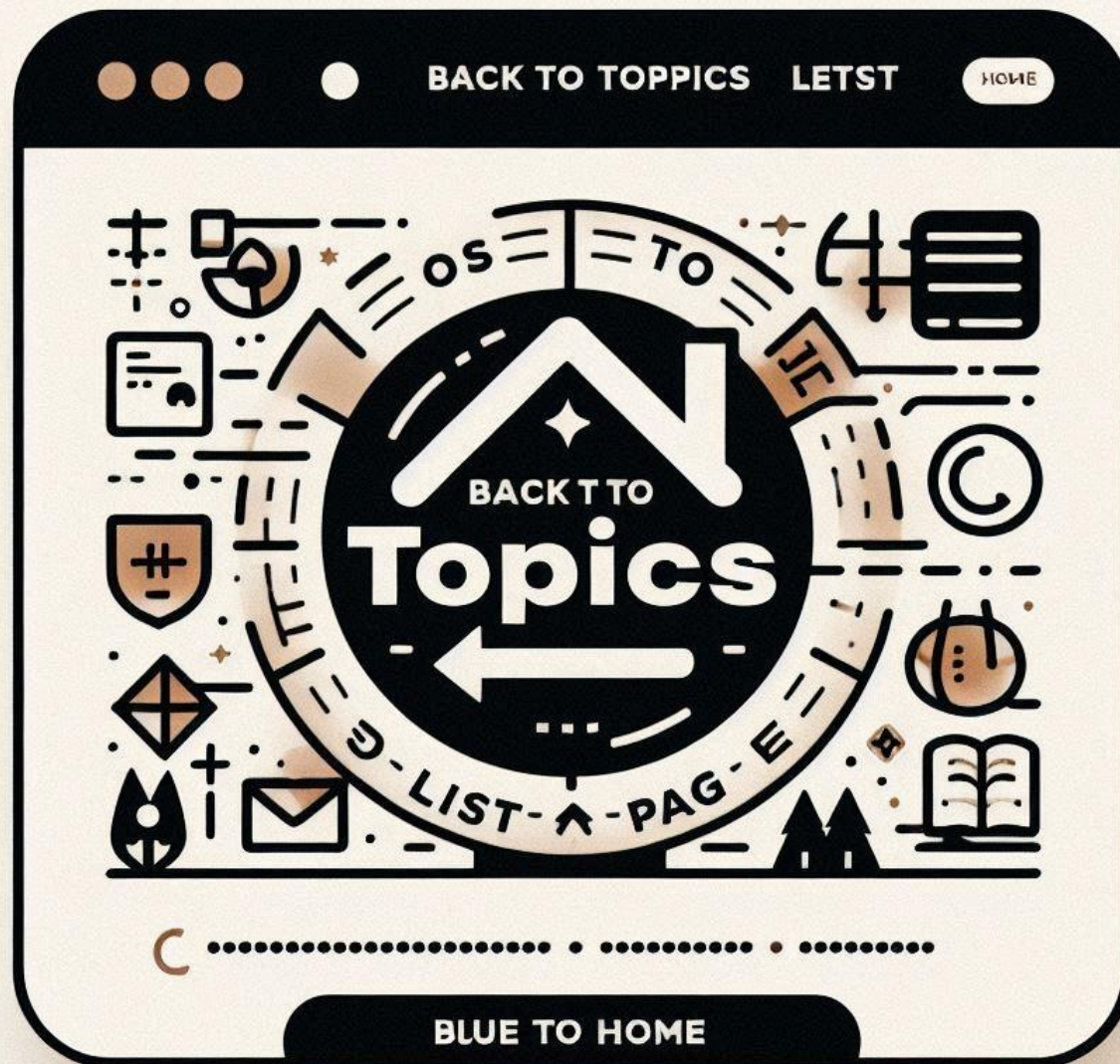
# Four steps to choose or realign your career path

# Bhagavat Gita on Varna and Svadharma

# In the battlefield, Krishna says this to Arjuna..



- In the battlefield, when Arjuna saw, he must fight with his own Guru (teacher), and relatives, he decided to quit from the war rather than killing them all and claim victory.
- Krishna tried giving him the clarity on what Arjuna must do and why. One of the key messages was the below one. Please read it, then pause to understand what has been said in this statement.
- **Bg. 3.35**
- श्रेयान्स्वधर्मो विगुणः परधर्मात्स्वनुष्ठितात् ।  
स्वधर्मे निधनं श्रेयः परधर्मो भयावहः ॥ ३५ ॥
- *śreyān sva-dharmo viguṇaḥ para-dharmāt sv-anuṣṭhitāt  
sva-dharme nidhanaṁ śreyaḥ para-dharmo bhayāvahaḥ*
- **Translation**
- It is far better to discharge one's prescribed duties ("svadharma"), even though faultily, than another's duties perfectly. Destruction in the course of performing one's own duty is better than engaging in another's duties, for to follow another's path is dangerous.

# What was said in Bg.3.35

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- **Each person has a natural role** to play in life, aligned with their **qualities (gunas)** and **nature (svabhava)**. Abandoning one's own role for another's—even if it seems easier or more prestigious—leads to **confusion, anxiety, and spiritual stagnation**.
- **Svadharma** - One's own natural role/right duty. Comes from his/her svabhava (inner nature)
- This teaching is deeply tied to the Varna system **in its ideal form**, where each person's duty was meant to align with their inner disposition, not by birth.

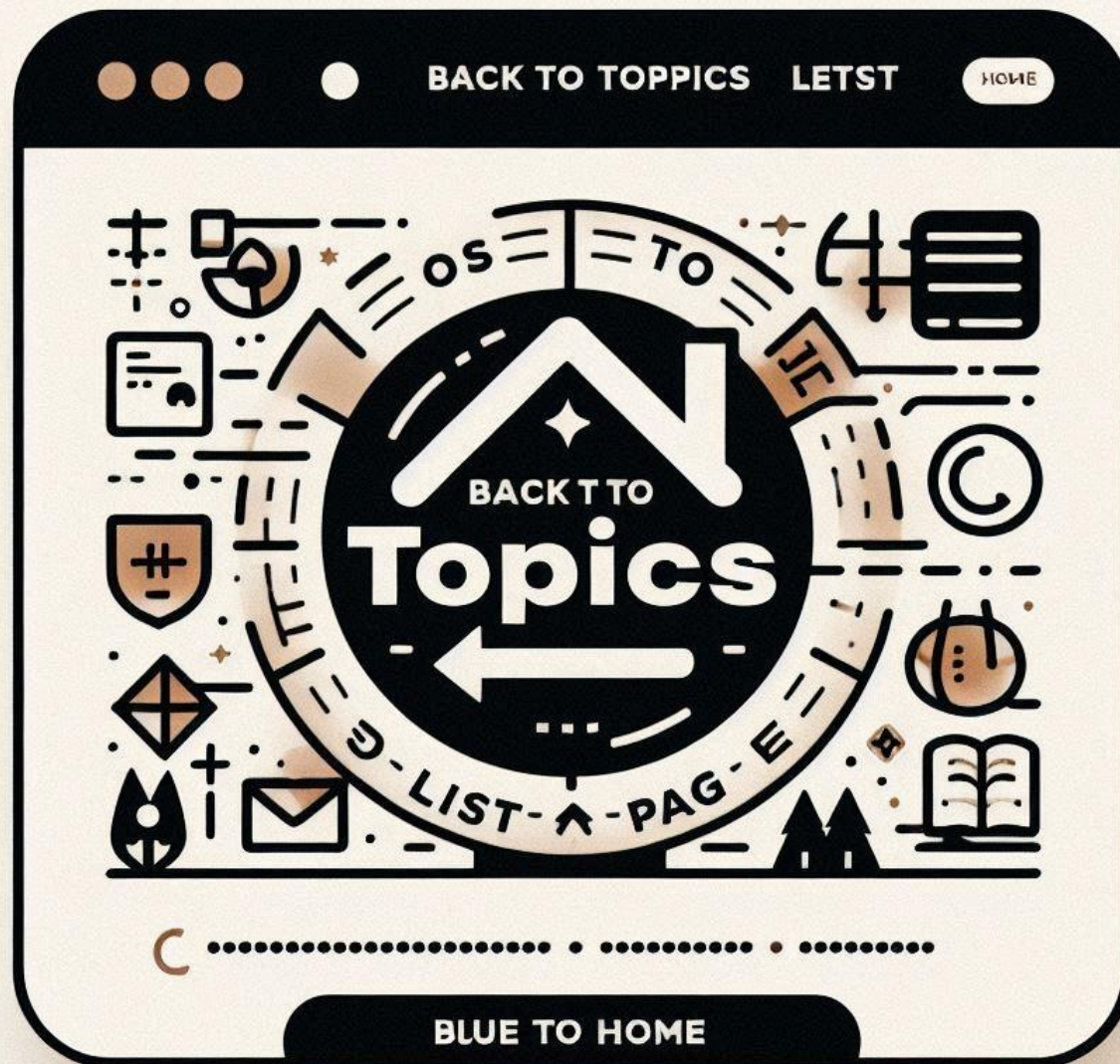

# What is Varna?

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- Varna (वर्ण) – “Your Natural Disposition”
- **Meaning:** Varna means *color* or *type*, but in the Vedic context, it refers to your **inner nature or archetype**, not birth-based caste.
- **Represents:** Your **personality, tendencies, and core strengths**.
- There are 4 types:
  - Brahmin – Educator / Thinker
  - Kshatriya – Warrior / Leader
  - Vaishya – Merchant / Strategist
  - Shudra – Labourer / Doer

# What is Svadharma?

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- ♦ Svadharma (स्वधर्म) – “Your Own Duty”
- **Meaning:** "Sva" = self, "Dharma" = duty → **your personal, rightful path in life.**
- **Represents:** The **work, responsibilities, and path** that suit your Varna and Guna (qualities).
- It is the **career or role** that feels fulfilling, natural, and purposeful.

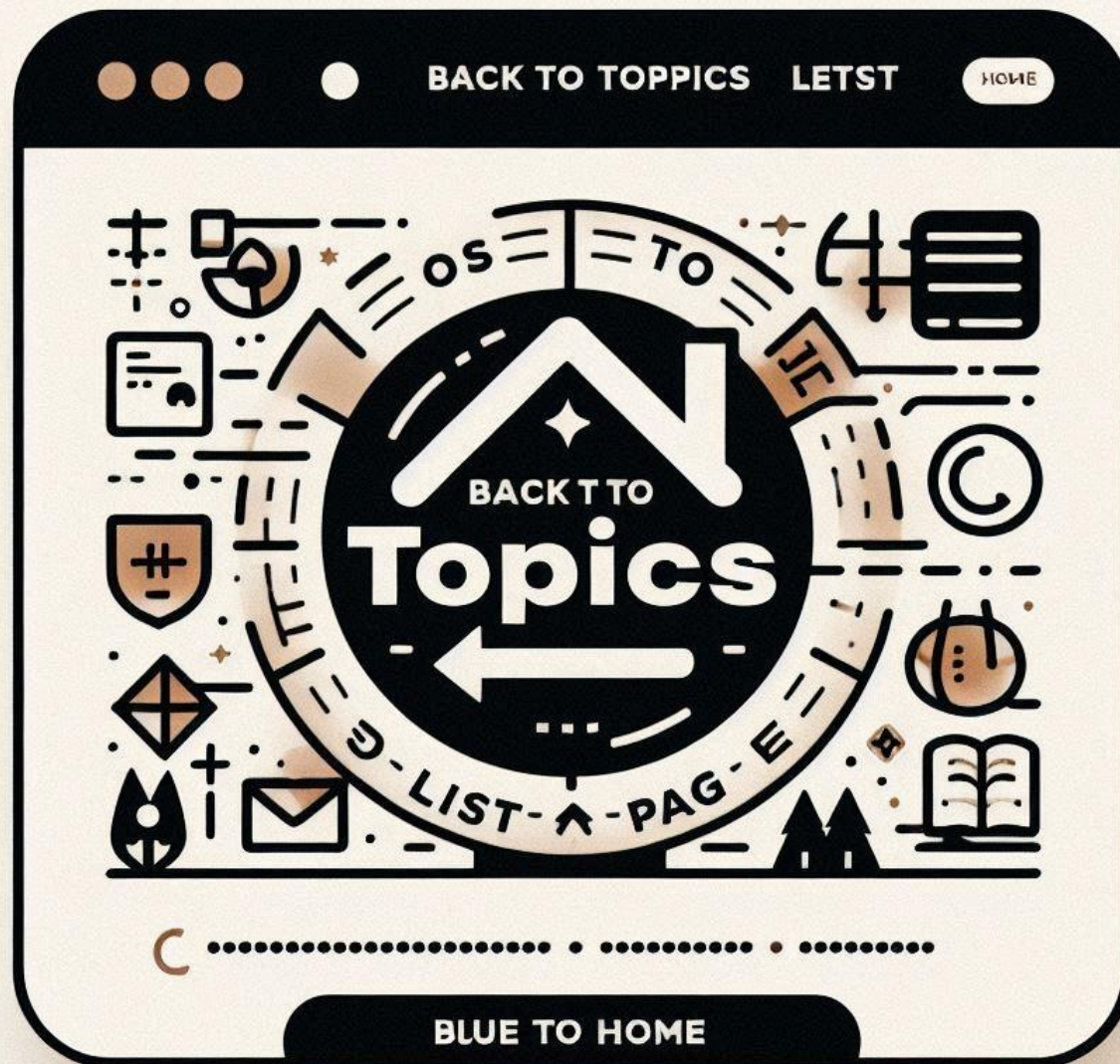
# What is a holistic goal for one?

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-  **Alignment Goal:** *Choose a career where your Varna (nature) supports your Svadharma (right work).*





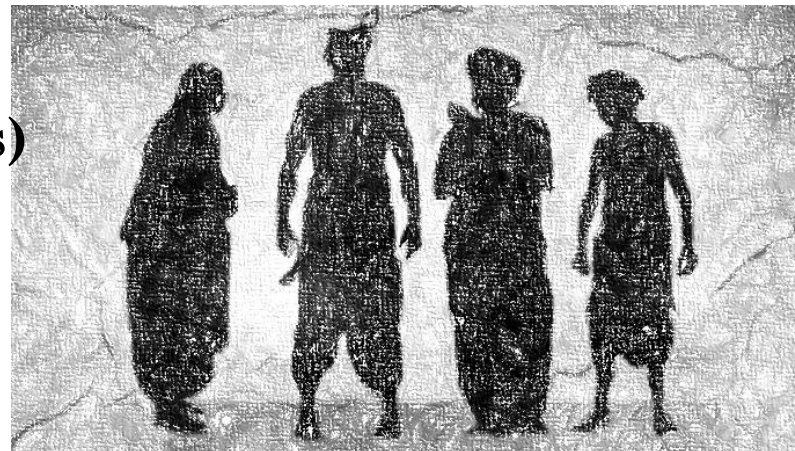

# What is Varna?

- Varna - A functional efficient division of society during Vedic period
- Basis - Guna (nature) + Karma (actions), of an individual in that birth
- Varna is Not based on - Birth, family name, or caste
- Goal of Varna system - Harmony in society and self-realization
- There were four main Varnas in Vedic society:
  - **Shudras (Artisans / Laborers)**
  - **Kshatriyas (Warriors, Kings)**
  - **Vaishyas (Traders / Merchants)**
  - **Brahmans (Educators)**



# Varna system : Shudra (Laborers)

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- We all know, humans were initially nomadic. They were travelling for water and food.
- Later humans started getting in to farming and agriculture, which paved way to settlements, and they started living as a community.
- Community was filled with “**Laborers**” who took different forms of work (fishing, herding, agriculture, hunting) to get the necessary food for self, family, friends and community.
- So, Laborers / Shudras were obvious first Varna of the human society.

# Varna system : Kshatriyas (Warriors)

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- Once Laborers settled in communities and the number of communities increased, the competition between them also arose.
- With the competition, fights between communities also rose.
- So, part of laborers had to take charge of protecting their own community first, which paved way to "**Warriors**".
- There are various roles of warriors like a soldier, commander, King etc.,. They all trained their body and mind to excel at protecting the people and community.
- We can even notice today, once human being's basic need for food and shelter is met, the next immediate instinct is the need for "security".
- Warriors gave "sense of security" to the community of Laborers.

# Varna system : Vaishyas (Merchants)

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- With the protection from "Warriors", the communities started thriving..
- Different communities lived in different landscapes, having access to varied natural resources. So, each community was producing certain types of foods in excess.
- When the food produced by one community became in excess, it was quite natural to look for exchange of goods with nearby communities.
- This paved way to "**Merchants**" those who started taking the responsibility of exchanging the foods, cattle and man-made goods with different communities.
- Merchants started working with nearby communities and over time, they started even going across the lands and seas for trading.

# Varna system : Brahmans (Educators)

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- As communities started thriving with dedicated "Laborers", protected by "Warriors" and "Merchants" bringing in more wealth, comfort and conveniences, now they started to seek beyond meeting basic needs of food, shelter, security, comfort and conveniences.
- People started to seek for sustained happiness or bliss and meaning for life on earth. This paved way to "Brahmans" varna.
- People of **Brahmana Varna** are the one who chose to have high **sattva guna**, pursuit of knowledge, purity, discipline. Dedicated their lives to **spiritual learning, teaching, and rituals**. Their duties extended beyond advising kings to include: **Ethics, Education, Spiritual mentoring**

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- 🛠️ Traits: Practical, hands-on, reliable, grounded
- 💪 Skills: Physical work, machinery, precision tasks
- ❤️ Values: Stability, hard work, supporting others
- 🎯 Ideal Paths: Technician, craftsman, healthcare support, logistics

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- ✖ Traits: Brave, decisive, assertive, protective
- 🧠 Skills: Strategy, leadership, crisis management
- ❤ Values: Duty, honor, courage, protection
- 🎯 Ideal Paths: Military, police, surgeon, emergency responder, executive roles

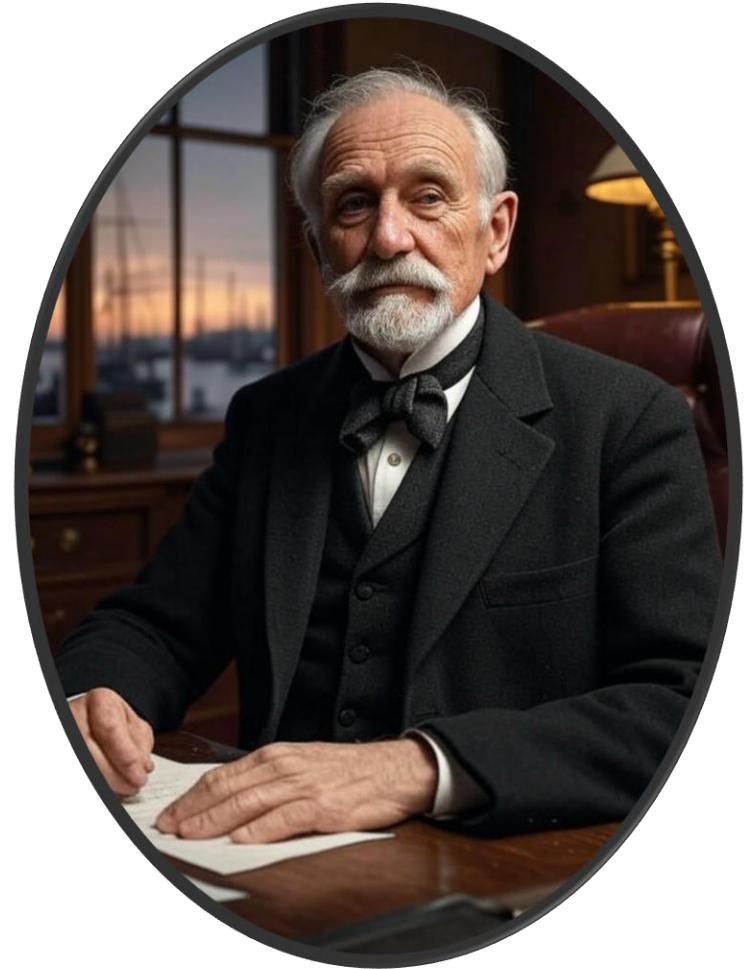

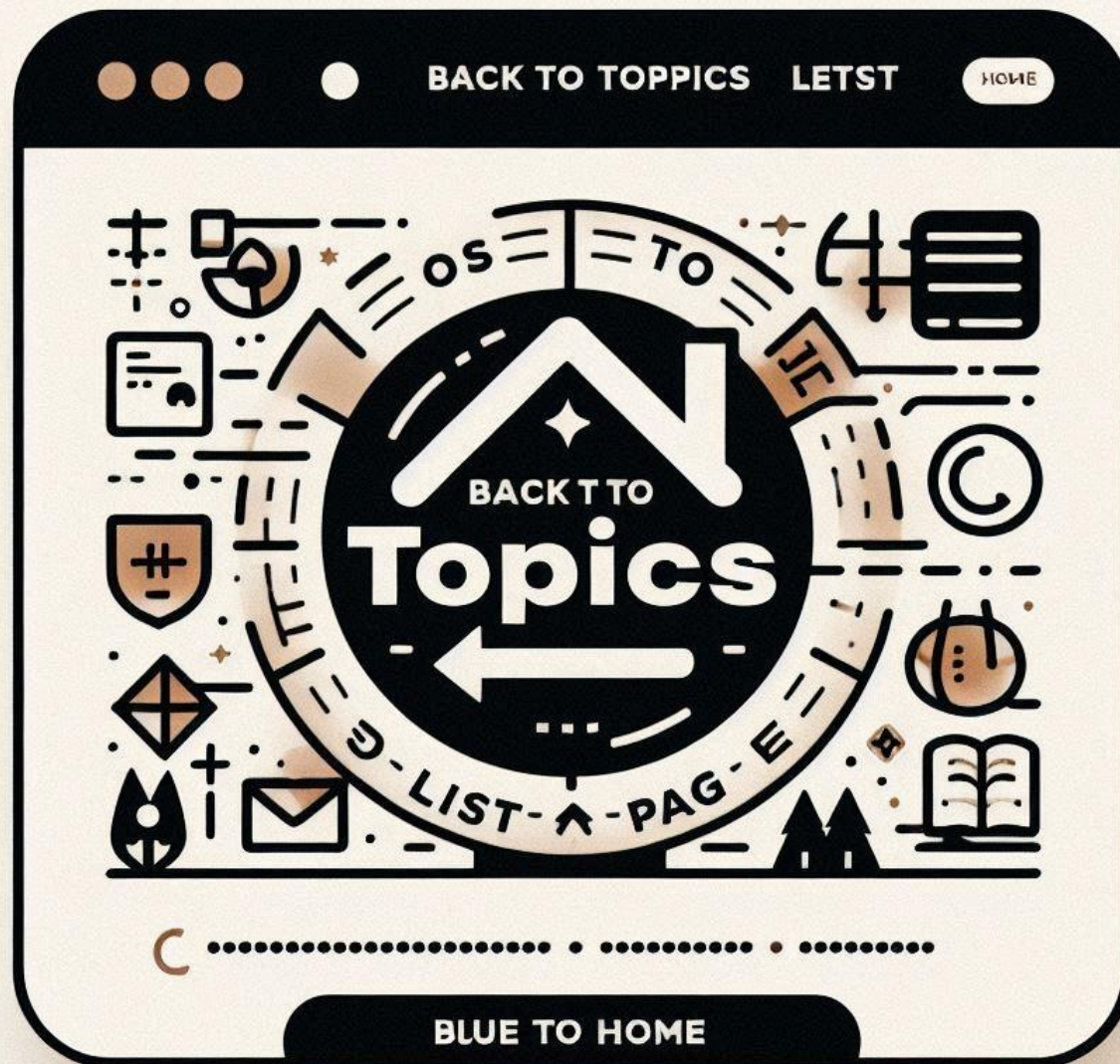
# Do I have only one Varna?

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- ◆ All four Varnas exist in everyone — we are a mix of qualities (gunas).
- ◆ **Your true Varna is the one that feels most natural, joyful, and meaningful.**
- ◆ You will have a primary Varna and may have secondary influences.
- ◆ Ask yourself: Which role do I return to again and again with energy and flow?
- ◆ Gita (3.35): 'Better one's own dharma, even if imperfect...'

# Why Know Your Varna & Svadharma?

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-  Clarity – Helps choose the right career path
-  Strength – Aligns with your natural talents
-  Peace – Reduces stress and inner conflict
-  Growth – Leads to sustainable success
-  Purpose – Gives deeper meaning to your work

“Better your own path done imperfectly than another’s perfectly.” – Bhagavad Gita 3.35

# How to know one's own Varna / Svadharma?

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- **For parents who wants to know the Child's Varna:**
  - This cannot be known easily at birth. A person born to Brahman mother or father need not necessarily be a brahman. Only the character of the newborn can decide it's Varna.
  - Parents shall let Children to express their innate character freely, rather than biasing them to take on certain definite career path. While kids express their character freely, parents can get a clue of the child's Varna.
- **For an adult to know their Varna: online questionnaires like the below can be of help.** (Note: To get the right results, before you take this test, your mind should be calm, relaxed but awaken. Answers should be based on your lifetime behavior and not just the recent one.)

# How to interpret the self test results?

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- You may get two Varnas in the result.
- Through accuracy of your self reflection, you can decide which one is your primary varna. The other one points to your current tendency.
- Note that, if the tendency varna is in alignment with your primary varna, that means you are on a career growth path and if not, vice versa. (You will get to know more on this topic in the following slides)

- Do I thrive in physical action, leadership, business, or teaching?
- 💡 Tip: Journal your answers. Look for recurring themes to discover your true Varna.




# Other methods to Discover Your Svadharma / Varna - #1

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## • 1. **Deep Journaling & Reflection (Over Time)**

- Write regularly about: What kinds of work energize you vs exhaust you?
- What do people naturally ask you for help with?
- What topics or tasks make you forget time?
- In your toughest moments, which strengths helped you lead, serve, think, or trade?
-  Tip: Patterns reveal your Varna more than isolated moments.

## • 2. **Meditative Self-Inquiry**

- Use stillness to ask: “What is my nature? What role feels most like me — even if no one praised me for it? ”Practice this consistently — answers emerge not through logic, but from the heart’s stillness.

## • 4. Personality Tests (as Supplements)

- Use tools like:
  - **Myers-Briggs (MBTI)** — identifies natural temperament
  - **Enneagram** — reveals deeper motivations and fears
  - **CliftonStrengths / VIA Strengths Survey** — highlights natural talents
  - ♦ Map results to Varna archetypes (e.g., INTJ or INFP might lean Brahmana; ESTJ could be Kshatriya, etc.)

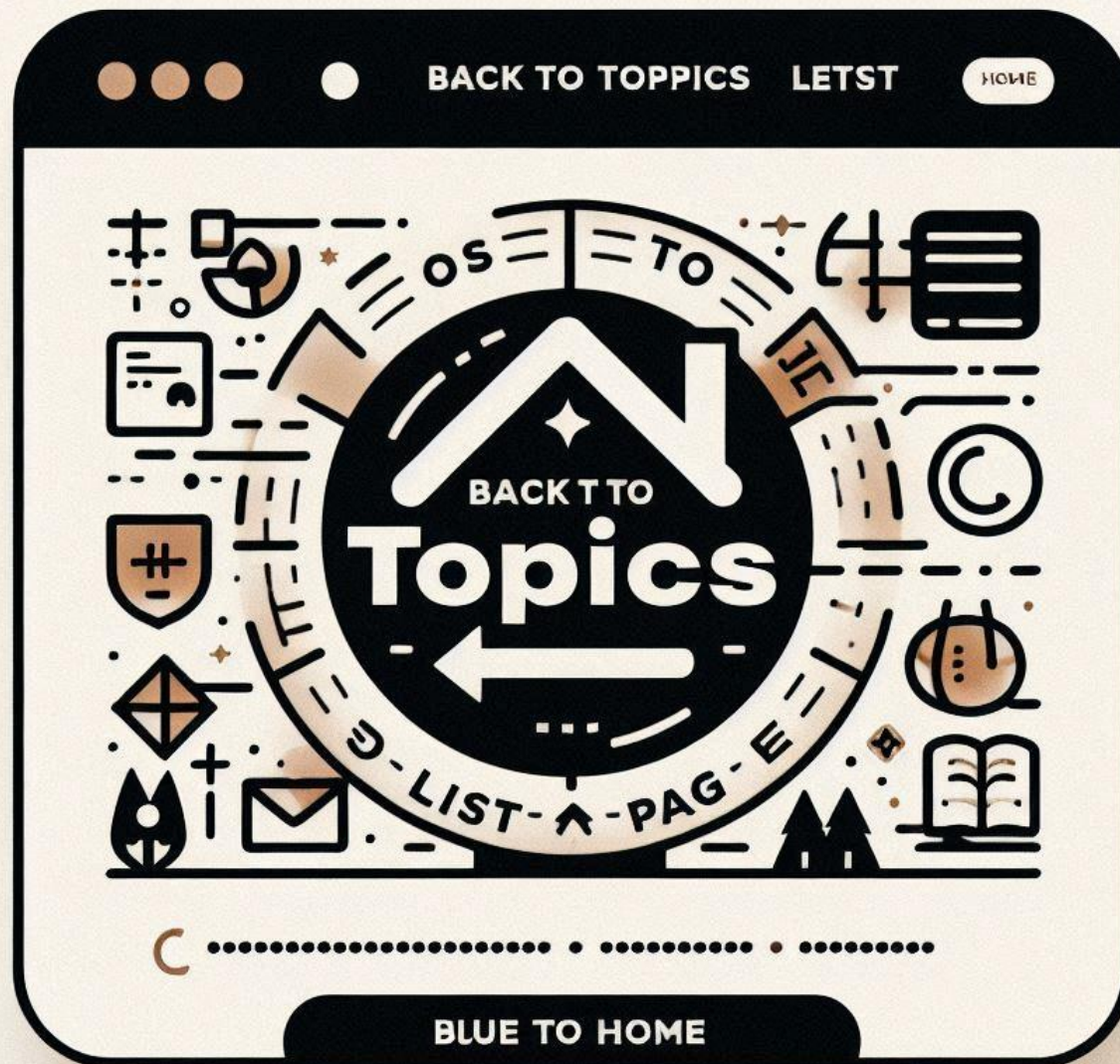


## • 5. 360° Feedback from Others

- Ask: Friends, mentors, and family: “What do you think is my natural role?”
- Spiritual guides: “What guna do I seem to lead with?”
- ♦ Sometimes others see your patterns and strengths better than you do.

## • 6. Observe Your Role Under Pressure

- In times of chaos, what role do you naturally assume?
- The thinker and advisor (Brahmana)?
- The protector and leader (Kshatriya)?
- The negotiator and stabilizer (Vaishya)?
- The supporter and helper (Shudra)?
- ♦ Under stress, essence reveals itself.

# Aspiring to be another Varna – Good or Bad?



## Is Aspiring to Another Varna Always Progressive?

- Not necessarily. Aspiring to a different varna can be either progressive or regressive, depending on why and how it's done.



## Progressive Aspiration (Upliftment)

- When you genuinely grow in Guna (qualities) — especially Sattva — and align with higher responsibilities. E.g., A Shudra (doer) becoming a Brahmin (teacher) through deep learning and self-discipline
- This is evolution — inner growth, not ambition



## Regressive Aspiration (Ego/Imbalance)

- When someone abandons their Svadharma out of insecurity, social pressure, or status-seeking. E.g., A Vaishya (merchant) trying to become a Kshatriya (leader/warrior) just to gain power, without the inner discipline
- This leads to conflict, burnout, and dissatisfaction

Bhagavad Gita 3.35 warns against this: “Better to fail in one’s own dharma than succeed in another’s.” Because your inner nature must match the outer role for harmony.



# Why People Desire to Shift Varna – and When It's Wise?

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- ◆ Humans are evolving — a pull toward another Varna can reflect inner growth.
- ◆ Social status, aspiration, or ego may cause us to resist our true Varna.
- ◆ Some have hybrid dharma — a blend of traits from multiple Varnas.
- ◆ Gita 3.35: 'Better one's own dharma, even if imperfect...'
- 🕒 Move only if your guna and karma have genuinely transformed — not for prestige.
- 🌱 Your dharma matures like a tree — from the roots of your svabhava.

## 🔱 1. Brahmana (Educator, Priest, Thinker)

Aspiring to →	Elevation?	Reason
Kshatriya	✅ Elevating (if dharmic)	If they uphold righteousness and protect truth (e.g., Vishvamitra).
Vaishya	⚖️ Neutral or Regressive	If motivated by material gain; but noble if wealth is used for dharmic support.
Shudra	❌ Generally Regressive	Manual labor may not align with their guna unless done as <b>seva (selfless service)</b> .

# I am of Kshatriya Varna; can I be a successful Laborer?






## 🗡️ 2. Kshatriya (Warrior, Ruler, Administrator)

Aspiring to →	Elevation?	Reason
Brahmana	✅ Elevating (if sincere)	Requires deep inner transformation and detachment from power. Historical example: <i>King Janaka</i> , a philosopher-king.
Vaishya	⚖️ Neutral or Slightly Regressive	Trading wealth for power often diminishes focus on dharma. May lead to greed.
Shudra	❌ Regressive	Relinquishing leadership for service without dharmic cause is a fall in duty.

## 3. Vaishya (Merchant, Farmer, Artisan)

Aspiring to →	Elevation?	Reason
Brahmana	 Elevating	If they renounce material goals for knowledge and service to truth. Needs strong sattva guna.
Kshatriya	 Elevating	If they take up leadership for the <b>protection of dharma</b> , not ego or ambition.
Shudra	 Generally Regressive	Giving up productive, economic role without a spiritual reason is discouraged.

# I am of Laborer Varna; can I be a successful Educator?



## ✂ 4. Shudra (Laborer, Helper, Servant)

Aspiring to →	Elevation?	Reason
Vaishya	✓ Elevating	Moving into productive and independent economic roles is upliftment.
Kshatriya	✓ Elevating	If they develop courage and leadership and act righteously.
Brahmana	✓ Highly Elevating	If they pursue learning, discipline, and spiritual realization. Many <b>Bhakti saints</b> (e.g., Ravidas, Tukaram) were from this background.

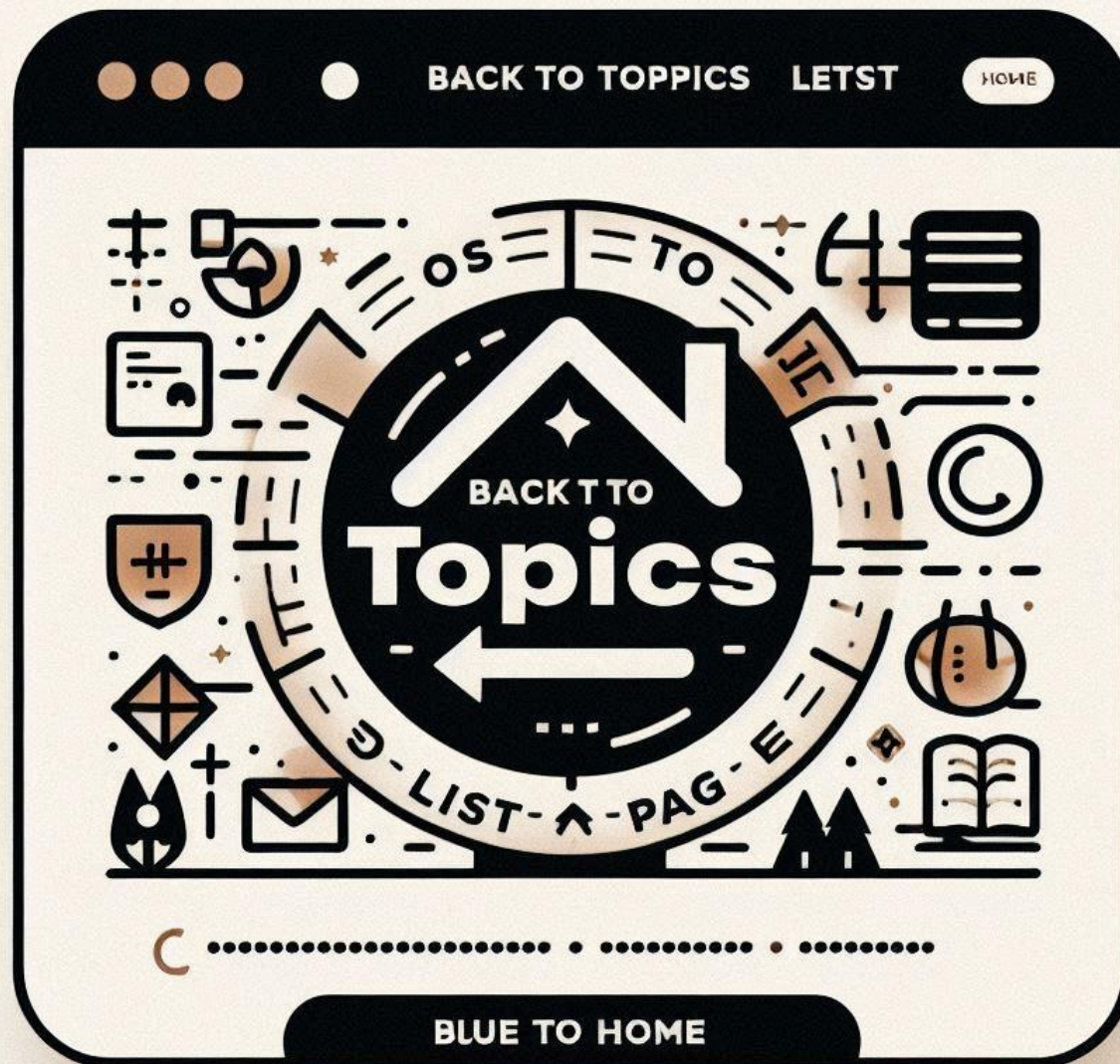
**“Better one's own dharma (svadharma), though imperfect, than another's done perfectly...”**

This isn't to say you *can't* grow — but:

- Growth must happen **within your svabhava**, not by abandoning it.
- Changing your external role **without transforming your inner nature** leads to suffering and frustration.

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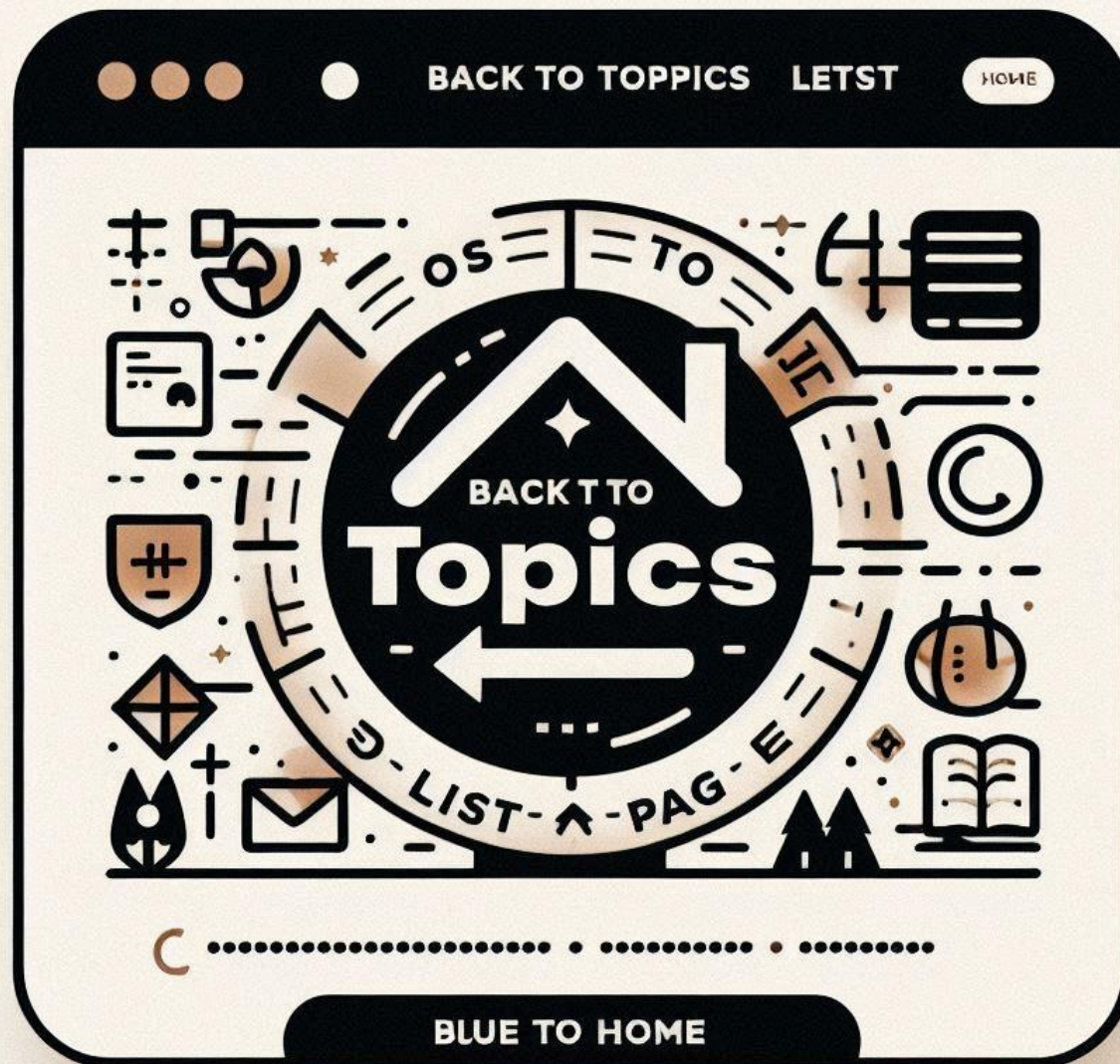


## 4. Laborer (Shudra Varna) – Practical & Hands-On Work

- **Technician or Maintenance Engineer** – Working in power plants, factories, substations
- **Embedded System Developer** – Writing firmware for electronics-based products
- **Electrical Contractor** – Providing wiring and electrical installation services

# Characteristics of a Warrior

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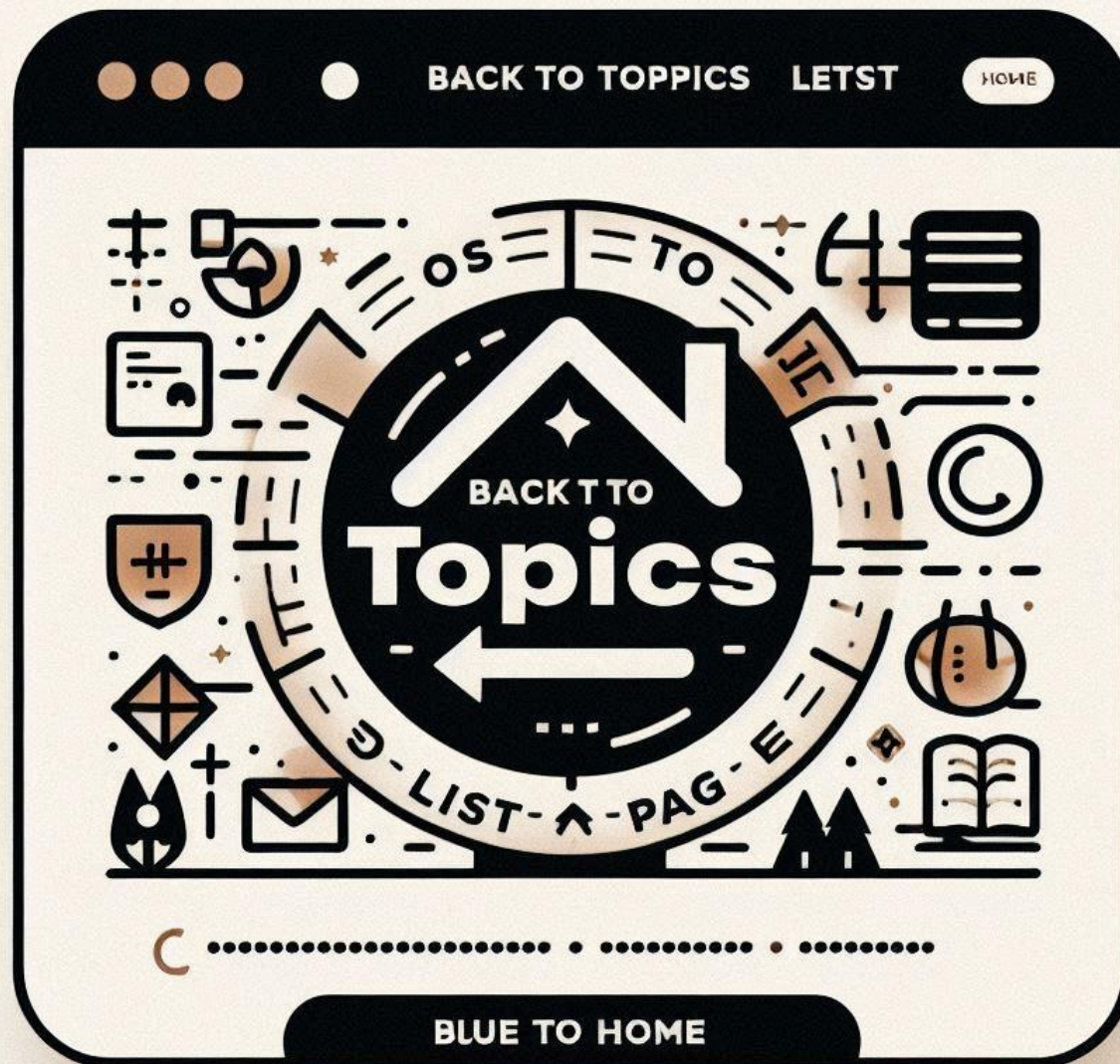


## 2. Warrior (Kshatriya Varna) – Leadership & Action-Oriented

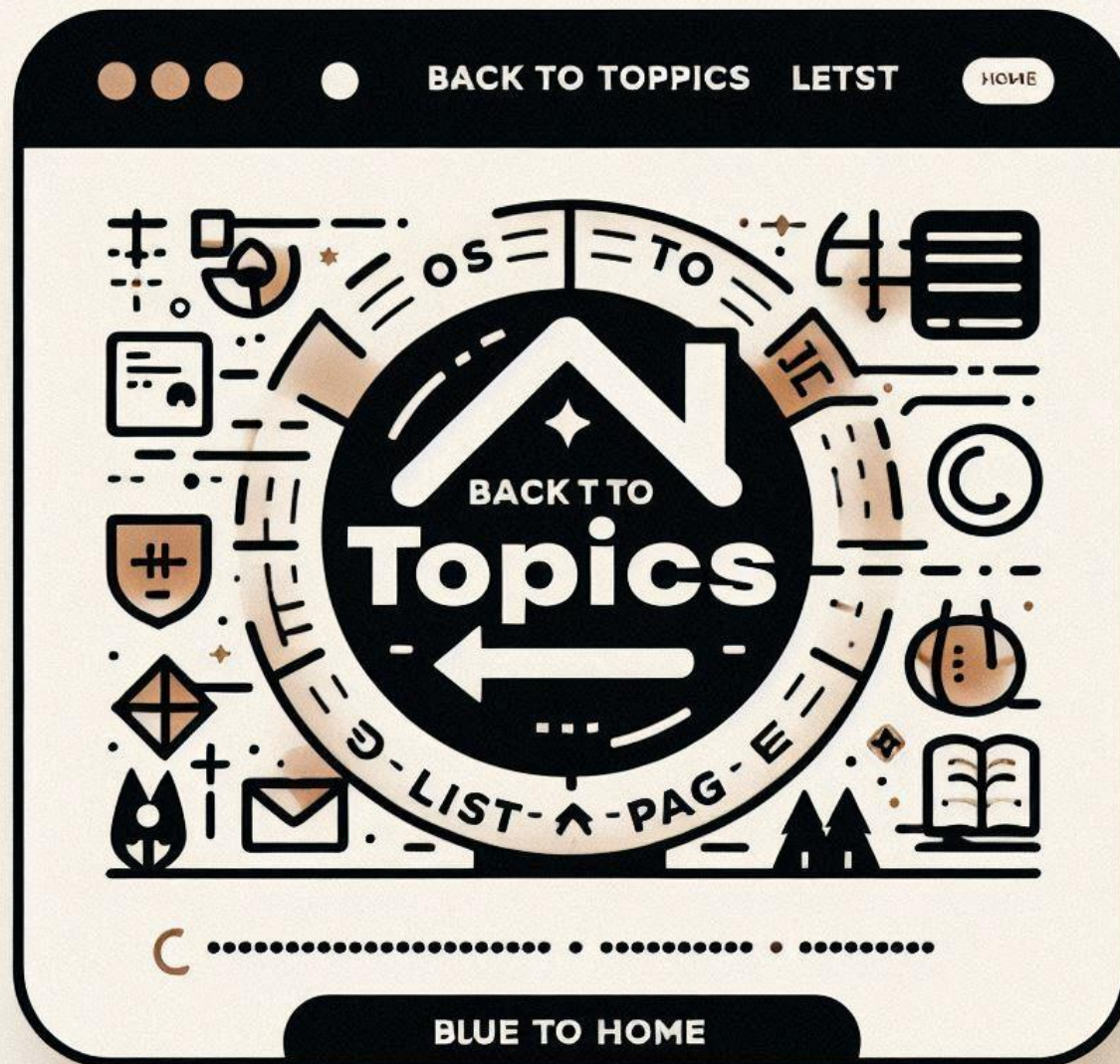

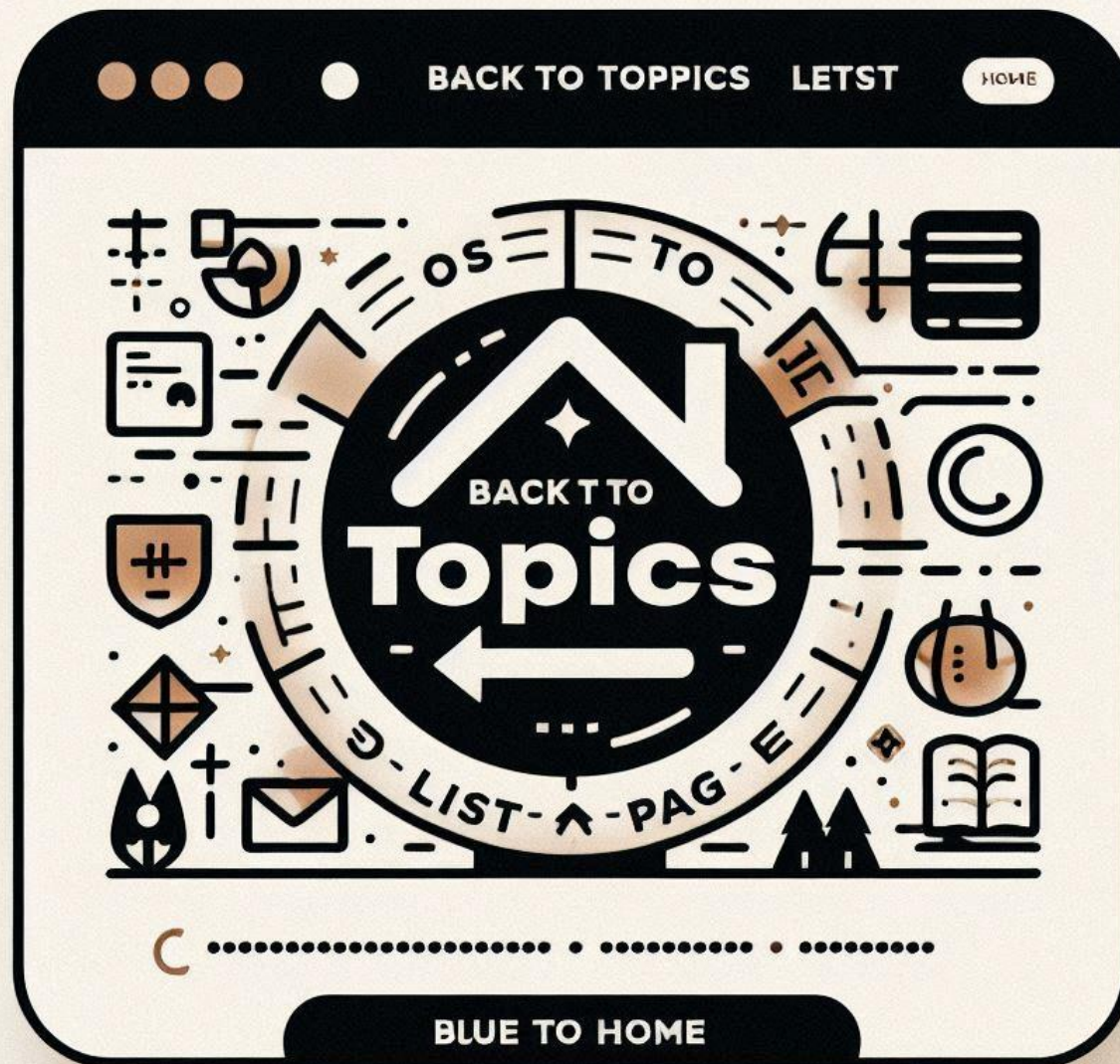
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## 1. Educator (Brahmin Varna) – Knowledge-Oriented

# Typical alignment of Varna and Yoga

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- The type of Yoga path one follows typically is also in resonance with the type of their character or their Varna. (but all paths are ultimately open to all beings, regardless of background).

- **Jnana Yoga:** The purpose of Jnana Yoga is to attain knowledge of the true nature of the self and the universe. This path involves the study of scriptures and philosophical texts, as well as reflection and contemplation to gain a direct realization of the non-dual nature of reality. **(Resonates with Educators)**
- **Bhakti Yoga:** The purpose of Bhakti Yoga is to cultivate a deep and loving devotion to the divine. This path involves the practice of devotion, worship, and service to God or a chosen deity as a means to achieve spiritual realization. **(Resonates with Laborers)**
- **Karma Yoga:** The purpose of Karma Yoga is to achieve spiritual realization through selfless action and service to others. This path involves performing one's duties and responsibilities in a detached manner, without seeking personal gain or recognition. **(Resonates with Merchants)**
